VICTORIA DAY PARADE 11AM.

Departing Athol St south of 13th Ave at 11am. Led by the "PILE" brass band, the parade will make its way West along 13th before turning south down Elphinstone until it arrives at Les Sherman park. This year's theme is "From The Ground Up!"

OPENING CEREMONY 1PM. Our 2024 Festival Chair, Rob Truszkowski, will open the Festival with a blessing from Elder Darlene Banin followed by a greeting from Mayor Sandra Masters.

TIPIS will be in place for everyone, especially kids, to enter, explore and learn about. Elders and knowledge keepers will be onsite to demonstrate how to build a Tipi, why they are designed the way they are, plus they'll share a few stories of how Tipis shaped the lives of First Nations.

SELFIE STATION. Grab a fun photo with Regina's official bird: the Black-Capped Chickadee. Nature Regina volunteers will be there to answer questions.

PICNIC STAGE

KAWACATOOSE BOYS SINGERS AND DANCE TROUPE. An intergenerational Saskatchewan First Nations family group who travel together sharing cultural songs and dance through the heartbeat of Mother Earth.

NORTHERN LIGHTS BLUE GRASS AND OLD THYME MUSIC SOCIETY BAND. A toe-tapping old fashioned musical romp through the blue-grass catalogue. The Society was founded to teach, promote, preserve, and foster the traditional instruments and vocals of Saskatchewan.

BEN WINOSKI. Playing a variety of virtuoso guitar styles, Ben sells out wherever he plays. He rocked last year's Festival stage along with his son Morgan.

MORGAN MOATS. This Regina-based musician/songwriter has been writing about the unexpected changes life can throw our way.

3. PLAN FOR CROWDS. Large crowds can lead to lost family members. Please, make a plan with your children in case you get separated. The Cathedral Neighbourhood Centre at 2900 13th Ave is a safe and easy-to-spot landmark where Festival Volunteers will be there to help any lost ones.

4. CHECK YOUR WHEELS. Street Fair moves slow. Please carry skateboards and leave bikes with the Bike Valet in Holy Rosary School parking lot.

5. PLEASE! PLEASE! PLEASE! DON'T BRING YOUR PETS! We know this is not popular advice. But over 30 years of experience, we have found that even the chilliest of doggos find the Street Fair crowds to be a highly stressful experience. Please spare them that and leave them at home.

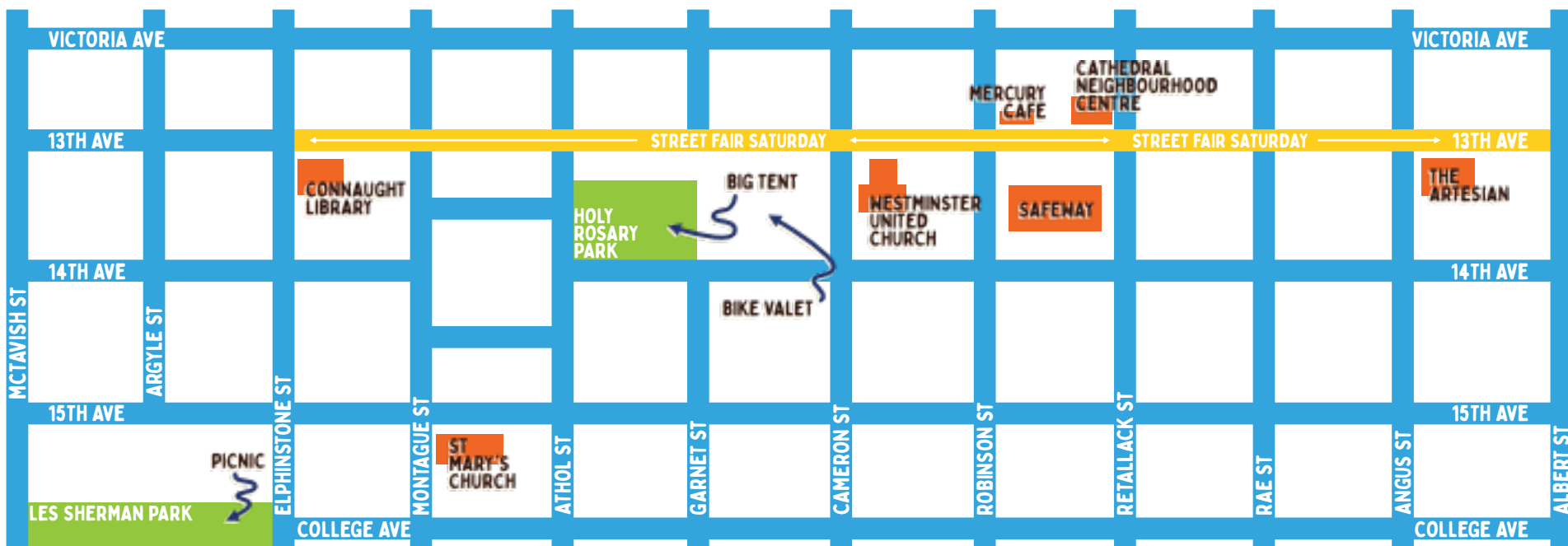
